Isolation in "The Wasteland" is a major theme that Eliot uses to capture the way in which the characters of the poem live. The symbols Eliot uses to represent this isolation are reoccurring in his use of descriptive language.

In T.S. Eliot's The Wasteland, water is symbolic for cleansing and rebirth, as well as death and destruction. One of its major themes is the barrenness of a post-war world in which human sexuality has been perverted from its normal course and the natural world too has become infertile. Eliot went on to convert to a High Church form of Anglicanism, become a naturalized British subject, and turn to conservative politics.

Eliot saw society as paralyzed and wounded, and he imagined that culture was crumbling and dissolving. "The Love Song of J. Alfred Prufrock" (1917) demonstrates this sense of indecisive paralysis as the titular speaker wonders whether he should eat a piece of fruit, make a radical change, or if he has the fortitude to keep living.
